NTCC Student Orientation

Mandatory

Accessible through myEagle, student orientation is a free series of videos, pictures, and information beneficial to a student's success at NTCC.

A series of quizzes will be scattered throughout the slides to test students' knowledge and attention.

Students have unlimited access to the orientation and may pick up on their progress at any time. Students must review the orientation in their first semester, or they cannot sign up for classes the following semester.

The "I want to learn more about" button will provide additional information on any of the topics at the end of the orientation.

How to access online student orientation:

1. Go to myEagle Portal.

2. Select the "Student" tab.

3. Select the "MyEagle Orientation" tab.

Emergency Notifications

Northeast Texas Community College offers an Emergency Alert Notification System to help keep students, faculty and staff informed in case a situation were to arise.

These alerts are used to convey urgent information including safety drills, campus closures, weather notifications or other potentially hazardous situations. Students are automatically signed up to receive alerts when they get accepted into the college using the phone number provided on their application. It is important to keep all contact information updated.

Students can also opt out of receiving emergency notifications at anytime. However, remaining in the system is strongly encouraged.

How to update your emergency contact information:

Step 1: Log into the myEagle Portal.

Step 2: Click the "Emergency Alert System" icon on the left side of the screen.

Step 3: Follow the directions to enter your desired cell phone number and e-mail address.



Student IDs & Parking Stickers

All students are required to have an myEagle Passport ID Card and a parking sticker.

Student IDs are used for reimbursements, dorm access and more. They also serve as a library, debit and meal plan card.

Vehicles found without a sticker will be fined.

Student IDs and parking stickers can be picked up in Student Services for free.

OneLogin upgrades NTCC's cyber security

Northeast Texas Community College's IT department has taken online security one step further with OneLogin, a multi-factor authentication, single sign on, one click way to access all of NTCC's web applications.

Students, faculty and staff can go to ntcc.onelogin.com to begin setting up OneLogin on their NTCC account.

"OneLogin takes MFA one step further by providing a single sign-on process," Sebastian Barron, director of computer and technical services, said. "That means once you log in to OneLogin, you will not have to sign into any of the apps offered within OneLogin."

Instead of receiving a text and inputting the code, users will simply receive an alert through the OneLogin Protect app on their mobile device. Students and staff will be alerted that someone is attempting to sign in using their credentials and will have the choice to allow or deny the connection attempt.

"No more jumping through different

web links and signing in," Barron said. Once users access OneLogin, they will be directed to a landing page that will display all of NTCC's core applications in one location. OneLogin will provide secure access to all NTCC applications.

^aOneLogin is one of the few products that offers security as well as ease of access at the same time," Barron said. "OneLogin is a win-win situation for the NTCC community."

MyEagle Portal

Blackboard Ultra

To log in to myEagle Portal, you must use their NTCC log-in information.

The username consists of the first initial of your first name, your full last name, and the last three digits of your Social Security number. The password is you eight-digit date of birth, MM/DD/YYYY.

Once logged in, the "Student" tab will be visible. This is where you will find the majority of their information.

Student Email

Student email accounts will be the official means of communication between you and your instructors and the college.

Your email needs to be checked every day for updates on student activities, college events, announcements, alerts and messages from instructors.

On the "Student" page of myEagle Portal is a "Student Email" tab. Login information for myEagle Portal is identical to that of your student email and Blackboard.

To avoid having to check the email each day, download the Microsoft Outlook app to receive instant notifications of new emails. Blackboard Ultra is an online schooling platform for all your classes. Here, you can access the class syllabi, assignments, grades and additional information from the instructors.

Important paths of information, such as grades and courses, can be found on the sidebar to the left for quick and easy access.

The application size scales to the screen it is on, making it computer, phone, and tablet-friendly.

Students can download the Blackboard app on their phones to receive notifications.

Students have the opportunity to view a video with instructions for navigating Blackboard Ultra on the college website.

Microsoft Office

Microsoft offers Office 365 to all NTCC students free of charge.

To download, go to www.office. com and sign in with your student login. From there, select the "Install Office" tab on the upper right corner of the page.

On the Office website, you can download everything Microsoft has to offer, including Microsoft Word and PowerPoint.

COVID-19

What is NTCC doing to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 on campus?

In accordance with Governor Abbott's executive orders GA-18 and GA-29, NTCC has adopted the minimum recommended health protocols for all individuals in Texas. All faculty, staff and students will be required to self-monitor for symptoms of COVID-19 and enhanced sanitation practices will be implemented.

What course formats will NTCC offer for fall 2020?

- Face-To-Face (F2F): With a limited number of students
- per classroom to allow for social distancing.
- Fully-Online (ONLN): Course delivered fully online via Blackboard
 Live Remote/Synchronous (SYNC): Connects students & instructors in a virtual classroom, allowing for more traditional interaction.
- Hybrid (HYBR): A combination of face-to-face & online formats.
- Hy-Flex (HYFL): Rotates between face-to-face & live remote online learning.

Housing & Meals

- On-campus housing is open with designated rooms for quarantine if needed.
- Capacity has been reduced in order to provide a more suitable environment for COVID-19 safety protocols.
- Since reservations are at capacity, a waiting list for students is available via the NTCC website.
- Modified Food Services are available to students and staff.



Athletics

Eagle Athletics are preparing for both Fall and Spring.

- Women's and Men's Soccer will begin in September.
- Rodeo practice will begin September/ October.
- Softball and Baseball practices will begin in February.

The store has flexible hours to accommodate students' schedules and knowledgeable bookstore specialists are always ready to assist.

If students need help finding course materials, information can also be found on the bookstore website, www. ntccbookstore.com. After browsing the catalog and finding all the materials required, the bookstore offers an estimated price and purchase options.

In order to pick up textbooks or uniforms, students must sign in using the kiosk at the entrance of the store or with their cell phones.

Students can buy new or used textbooks for the semester and sell them back to the bookstore after the course ends. Students should not remove the plastic wrapper until

New seating arrangements allow for

students to social distance while studying in the comfy sitting areas by the Jo's Coffee Shop.

This to-go stop for assorted drinks and snacks is also nicknamed the Caddo Café.

Students have access to socially-distanced, enclosed study booths for working on homework in a safe and private setting.

A computer lab is available in the LC for students with an NTCC login. The computer lab also offers a printing station and scanner.

Due to social-distance standards, a limited number of computers are available in the LC.

A second printing station can also be found in the

SUB.

Prices vary depending on what is being printed. Students can pay with a debit card or a printer card, which can be bought in the College Store.

Along with all the library services, the LC also houses NTCC's collection of Caddo Indian artifacts on display throughout the building.

The John Biggers mural and artwork are also features of the Learning Commons.





Glossary

SUB: Student Union Building

• Features the cafeteria, college store, recreational/ gaming area, ATM, printer and vending machines.

LC: Learning Commons

• Features the library, computer lab, Jo's Coffee Shop, private study booths, games, printer and historical artifacts.

HUM: Humanities building

• Known for its history, government, English and art courses and the Eagle room.

BT: Business Technology building

 Holds cosmetology, business and math classes, as well as Public Relations and Web Master offices.

UHS: University Health Science building

• Known for its health science classrooms and houses the Texas A&M University-Texarkana offices. The UHS building can be spotted by its clock tower.

MS: Math and Science building

• Has math and science classes and labs.

IA: Instructional Annex building

Houses Computer Services, Upward Bound, Communities in Schools, Funeral Services, the athletic training facility, and additional classes.

IT: Industrial Technology building

Located on I-30 near Lowe's.

Eagle Pantry assists students with food insecurity needs

In December 2018, the NTCC Social Work Club started the campus' first food pantry, and its size and significance have only grown since.

The Eagle Pantry is located in the Wesley Fellowship Ministry building on NTCC's main campus and is available to all NTCC students, both dorm and traditional.

The Eagle Pantry will be open every Thursday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. for curbside pickup through the Fall semester. The pantry will only fill orders for students who send a email to CARE@ntcc.edu from their NTCC student email at least one day in advance.

Dual credit students are asked to indicate that they are dual credit in their email. Once emailed, the pantry will respond with a time to pick up the care package.

The Eagle Pantry offers an assortment of non-perishable food items and hygiene products. Donations are always accepted, but the items must be non-perishable, nonfrozen and cannot be already expired.

NTCC students with their current student ID will be allowed to take home enough food to sustain the number of members in their household.

Last year, the pantry received the Innovation Solutions for Hunger Relief in Student Success grant. This two-year funding will pave the way for the pantry's growing future.

Carmen Shurtleff, instructor of social work and sociology, said she aspires to have an official care center on campus which will house both perishable and nonperishable foods, hygiene products, baby items and a clothing closet with a small fee.

Shurtleff is also now working with an on-campus, Master's-level case manager intern that will assist students with not only academic, but personal, mental and social issues.

GWD adjusts food services for COVID-19 precautions

With the recent COVID-19 pandemic, the Great Western Dining kitchen at Northeast Texas Community College has changed their layout and distribution system to accommodate for social distancing and help prevent the spread of the coronavirus.

"We are excited to see everyone as we begin our journey in this 'new normal,"" Nancy La Batt, NTCC Food Service Director, said. "I hope you will see that, even though some things had to be changed, we are doing all we can to offer you a great dining experience."

The food service area has been adjusted to allow for customers, only 13 at a time, to stand six feet apart. All other customers will have to stand in a socially distancing line at the register.

All food and drinks will be placed in disposable containers. Drinks and condiments, like the entrées, will be handed to the customers to prevent contamination. The meals will remain all-you-can-eat, however, La Batt said they will fill the disposable containers with as much food as they can.

"We will not be enforcing the oneentree-at-a-time this year because of the people taking it to go, and so many people will take it and leave the building. So we'll fill the box, basically, and that'll allow about two entrées plus sides or whatever. So we're kind of fudging on that a little bit."

The salads, pizza, fruit, and other buffet items will be placed in ready-to-go boxes. More than one of an item may be purchased in moderation. La Batt asks that customers not touch items they will not be purchasing.

"Hopefully people won't feel cheated when they walk out," La Batt said.

Non-dorm students who plan to regularly eat in the SUB can purchase a meal plan in the Student Services building.

Students can purchase up to 50 meals per semester with a pre-paid plan. Meal plans are non-refundable and cannot be transfered to another semester.

The meal plans are placed on the student's ID card, which will be swiped at the cafeteria register at every meal.

Students may pay for their plan with cash, check or financial aid.

If students are paying with financial aid and drop or lose their aid for any reason, they become responsible for paying for the meal plan.

NTCC self-sustainable Ag program is one-of-a-kind

A farm, a ranch, a state-ofthe-art agriculture building, a farmer's market, and it's all fully self-sustainable.

This describes the unique Ag department at Northeast Texas Community College. However, the program was not nearly this large 36 years ago when the college began teaching agriculture classes.

The college property was originally farmland, and a large portion of that land remains today as the Ag department's working farm.

The highlight of the department is the Elizabeth Hoggatt Whatley Agricultural Complex. The building is a certified green platinum facility, only one of four in the nation.

"There's a whole book of rules they had to follow in order to do the design, the materials they picked, all of that kind of things they had to follow," Rene McCracken, NTCC director of sustainable agriculture, said.

Until 2010, Ag classes were taught in the Industrial Annex building on the main campus. Two years later, McCracken arrived at NTCC, making a significant change in the Ag program.

"When I got here, they asked me to set up a small farm, a sustainable kind of market farm, where you're going to a farmer's market and you're selling stuff," McCracken said. "We're incorporating the kitchen that we have, and so it's basically from planting the seed all the way to the processing end of it. And that becomes the lab for all our students, but our community also enjoys it too."

The Ag program usually holds a farmer's market in

Mount Pleasant, however, the coronavirus has forced McCracken to think outside the box. The Ag Program established a drive-thru farmer's market under the pavilion at the Ag Complex.

Often, the Ag program will donate its food to the Eagle Pantry for students in need.

Hidden from view, the Eagle Ranch lays on the back-half of the 250 acres of Ag property.

"The ranch side is just cow, calves and hay, which is traditional, east Texas cow, calf operation," McCracken said. "It's ran that way. We have our registered bulls, though, and we do artificial insemination. All that stuff we do that is much more than what a typical ranch would do, because we are doing it for our students so that they know how."

Hidden behind the trees, the ranch is comprised of a

flourishing, green landscape of hills, a pond, a river with a bridge, and at least two small waterfalls.

The Ag program also has a plant and vegetable farm, flower patch, greenhouse, and animal pens, which surround the Ag Complex.

"Then on the farm side, that's where we pull in all the gardening, and the greenhouses. And the small things that work here better than cows are goats, and chickens, and turkeys, and things like that."

McCracken said that, while the ranch and farm work in different ways, the two work together to get the best out of the land.

"We really do start from the ground up," McCracken said. "We're improving the soils, we're reducing our waste, and that's part of sustainability, that's what it is."



Work programs at NTCC

With the national student debt standing at nearly \$1.6 trillion and climbing, Northeast Texas Community College offers an alternative way to finance college.

One option is the Work4College program, in which students earn a wage while also creating a fund for tuition.

This program is privately funded through donations from the community.

Since the program started in 2014, students have worked a variety of jobs, including the college farm, student services, student housing, the automotive shop, the library and the athletic department. Students can pick up an application for the Work4College program at the front desk in Student Services.

Work4College isn't the only job opportunity NTCC offers its students. The Federal Work Study Program is another employment option. Students, who receive a Pell Grant, can apply for a variety of Work Study positions. If hired, students can work up to 20 hours a week at minimum wage.

"It's like a part-time job," Kenzie Messer, Student Services Specialist, said.

Unlike Work4College, students receive their entire paycheck, rather than half of the funds going toward their college tuition.

Even students who do not receive a pell grant can still be employed as a Work Study student.

"If you don't meet that qualification to be a federal work study student, you can still be a student worker," Messer said. "But, you would have to be paid out of institutional budget funds, which come out of whatever department you're working for."

If they reapply and are accepted, student workers can keep their same job for the following semester.

To apply for a position, visit the Student Services lobby and review the job postings listed in the Work Study binder.

financial literacy. Northeast Texas Community College has invested in a software that allows students to gain insight into their financial personalities.


Students are able to use this software to improve their financial literacy by taking financial wellness courses. Additional tools include a scholarship and job search.

"I'm looking forward to meeting my students that are interested in financial literacy and working to figure out a budget that will work for them and their future," NTCC Financial Literacy Coach Linda Forrest said. "I feel financial literacy is going to be a tool that will serve them for the rest of their lives and it's part of the growing college experience."

Students will be able to access the software through their myEagle portal, by can view scholarship opportunities, take financial personality quiz, view job listings and recieve budgeting and credit score tips.

"The goal of the financial literacy department is to assist students in maintaining a spending plan and graduating from college with as little debt as possible," Forrest said. "Financial literacy covers a broad spectrum of information including scholarships, job search, career paths and good lifelong financial habits."

For the immediate needs of students, the scholarship search can help students find diverse funding opportunities for tuition. Scholarships can also fund additional fees, such as dorms, textbooks or other supplies. The search provides students with a wealth of options for applying to scholarships.

There is a possibility that some students started saving a while ago or stumbled across a pot of gold, but chances are most students need a plan to pay for college.

The U.S. Department of Education's office of Federal Student Aid is the best place to turn for assistance. The department is the largest provider of grants, loans and work-study funds.

When it is time to apply for aid, don't be shy to ask for help completing the free application for FAFSA. The official website is fafsa.gov.

NTCC, like any other college, will use the information on your FAFSA application to calculate how much aid will be awarded. If a student receives a grant or work-study job, the money will not have to be repaid. However, federal student loans must be repaid just like any other loan. Additional information about student loans can be found at studentloans.gov.

Applying for FAFSA does have some requirements, according to www. studentaid.ed.gov. A student must be a U.S. citizen or an eligible non-citizen and have a valid social security number.

A full list of requirements can be found on the website.

Texas residents, who do not qualify for FAFSA, can complete the Texas Application for State Financial Aid. If they qualify, students can receive some assistance. To be eligible for TAFSA, recipients must meet

eligibility requirements.

Kim Irvin, dean of financial aid and enrollment management, said a full list of these requirements, along with a link to download the application with instructions for the 2020 - 21 school year, are available at www.collegeforalltexans.com.


After completion of either the FAFSA or TASFA application, the college may require the student to verify the information submitted. If necessary, the NTCC financial aid office will notify the student to let them know what steps they need to take.

To access the NTCC Financial Aid page, go to the "Get Started" drop down menu on the college's website and select "Financial Aid." From there, a student can gain information about tuition costs and the types of aid available.

Students can also view several videos that explain the process for completing the FAFSA application by visiting www. ntcc.edu/financialaid and clicking on the Financial Aid TV Portal link in the bottom right hand corner of the page.

Filling out applications can be somewhat overwhelming and a bit stressful, but just relax, take a second and understand that it is OK to ask for help.
